BC Cancer Agency Centre for the North celebrates first anniversary

PRINCE GEORGE – Since seeing the first patient on November 1, 2012, the BC Cancer Agency Centre for the North has treated more than 550 patients closer to home.

Prior to the Centre opening, patients requiring radiation therapy had to travel to Vancouver or other BC Cancer Agency locations throughout the province. Now two radiation therapy machines called "linear accelerators" provide radiation therapy to northern cancer patients. This saves patients both time and money. The two machines are affectionately named after two rivers —The Fraser and The Nechako.

Other Highlights:

- Brachytherapy: Since 2013, people in BC's central interior have also had access to brachytherapy. This type of radiation therapy involves placing a small radioactive source in or near a cancerous tumor, which allows for a high dose of radiation that increases the likelihood the cancer is destroyed while reducing the risk of damage to nearby healthy tissue. Over the last year the Centre for the North has performed brachytherapy treatment on patients with endometrial cancer.
- Palliative care: The availability of radiation therapy in this part of the province also improves access for palliative patients to receive treatment. Palliative radiation therapy is not intended to cure, but to relieve symptoms and pain caused by cancer. Of the Centre's 418 radiation therapy patients, about half of them have been palliative.
- **Left-breast cancer therapy:** specialized treatment for left-breast cancer is also now available. This type of reduced radiation treatment is important to ensure less radiation is delivered near the heart and lungs.
- First clinical trial: In October 2013 the Centre for the North opened its first clinical trial, NCIC MA.33, a randomized trial for early breast cancer patients. This clinical trial is studying the difference between standard whole breast radiation versus standard whole breast radiation plus an eight day boost of radiation to the surgery site.
- Chemotherapy: While providing radiation therapy is an important part of what the Centre for the North does, it also provides systemic therapy (known as chemotherapy). Since opening last year, the Centre for the North has treated 144 patients with systemic therapy.

 Additional services: The Centre for the North also includes patient and family counselling, psychiatry services, nutrition support, and cancer care support for northern Aboriginal communities.

The BC Cancer Agency Centre for the North works alongside Northern Health, and the University of Northern British Columbia to ensure that cancer patients get the best care possible.
